#### Educational Objectives:

Etiology of sexual deviance

- 1) Participants will be able to define the Integrated Theory of Sexual Offending and explain how the dynamics of biological, neuropsychological, and ecological factors contribute to deviant sexual interest
- 2) Participants will be able to describe the role of sexual deviance over the lifespan of an offender

Evaluation/risk assessment of adult, specialized populations of sexual offenders, and adolescent sexual offenders that have established scientific bases

- 1) Participants will be able to describe an actuarial risk assessment procedures and discuss the differences between actuarial and clinical methods of risk assessment

Dr. Michael P. Brannon is the Director of the Institute for Behavioral Sciences and the Law. Dr. Brannon is regularly appointed as an expert by the judiciary and is often called upon as an expert witness or forensic consultant to attorneys. His areas of expertise include risk assessment, sexually violent predator assessment, false confessions, children who murder children, domestic violence, sex offender assessment, substance abuse, malingering, ADHD in legal cases, competency, insanity, and penalty phase evaluations; he has been qualified as an expert in all of these cases.
